

#### One Man's Story about Cars and PTSD, by Mike Jankowski

I've often mentioned what Triumphs can mean or be to us: more than the cars. Many times, the cars are just the stitching that hold the fabric of friendships together. Or can be a key to a great or life altering experience. So it was for me. I have PTSD. I saw some of the fiercest combat of the 90s in Sub-Saharan Africa. Burundi, Liberia, Ivory Coast, Congo, Chad, Rwanda, Sierra Leone, to name a few. The easy assignment was teaching Kenyan rangers small squad warfare to combat poachers. And even that was a full on shooting war at the time.



When I got out in late 1997, I had trouble sleeping, I was ok at relationships, I held a job. I was high functioning, which is better than many. But I had issues with depression, and nightmares, and survivor's guilt. It was a struggle to get through the nights. Days not so much, as the day and work and friends kept me occupied. Nights, however, were very dark. If I wasn't exhausted or passing out drunk I slept maybe 2 hours a night.

Thankfully, working on my cars kept me occupied into the late night. I'd take a shower and collapse. Or I rode my bike until I could pedal no more. But those weren't healthy workable solutions. What began a process of coming out of this dark valley was a chance encounter, faith in what another person told me, and perseverance. And it all happened because of a Triumph.

The start of this journey was a different GT6 I had, a 1970. Another sleepless night, another drive to a town along Conrail's main line to watch trains and eat at a diner. It was a cool, but not yet crisp fall night. In a GT6, it meant you were somewhat comfy with the windows down due to the heat soaking through the firewall. I pulled into a parking spot on the street across from the diner, which faced the tracks. I got a burger, Coke, fries, cottage cheese, and watched the trains roll by through the window.

I liked it there. The manager and waitress knew me, and didn't care how long I stayed. I was a good tipper and quiet. When I was there I felt safe, and that I belonged. I could be part of a social circle while invisible. Usually. Until this night. A guy maybe in his 40's, came in, and I saw him point to my car while talking to the manager. He was directed to me.

"Hey, I'm Jim. Nice GT6. I've got a TR6 at home. I love the GTs." We had a decent talk, and he had been in the Army as well. Then he dropped the bombshell. "Don't sleep much, do you? How bad was it?" I was dumbfounded. How'd he know? I just said I had been in the Army. "You have the stare."

I just sat there. Was it that obvious? I swallowed hard. "Nope. Sleep very little. Dreams take me back there often. I just exhaust myself to sleep a few hours a night if that." He said he understood, he has been on the same road. We talked about some of our worst moments. We both lost best friends, had close calls, and tried as best we could to describe some of the horrors we'd seen.

No one outside of my unit had similar experiences to me. A door slowly opened. Through it was a faint distant glimmer of hope, at least it was there. I never considered taking my life, but I often wondered how long I'd live on 14 hours of sleep a week. In all honesty, I didn't care. Now I did care. We headed outside, and another train was approaching fast. It was a hotshot piggyback train, one of my favorite types. A smile came across my face as it roared by.

"Why are you smiling?" I kind of laughed as the end of train flasher faded into the distance. With a shrug I said "It is nothing but possibilities going by. Potential yet to be realized." Jim laughed a hearty laugh. "You're an optimist. You need that." After that night, Jim and I met regularly at the diner, every other Wednesday. He brought his TR6 every time after we met.

We compared stories of drives, road trips, funny mechanical failures, laughed at the funny failures, cried at the painful memories of combat, and toasted friends lost. We would help each other with little jobs on each other's cars in the street. I began to look forward to the drive every other Wednesday night. I always made sure my car was ready. That door was opening wider, and the faint glimmer was a distant glow.



Jim and I sometimes had other Triumph guys meet us there. On those occasions, we focused on the cars. Jim and I kept our demons to each other. After two years, I was getting ready to move back to N.Y. where I'm from. I told Jim I was moving. He smiled, gave me a high five, and said "Your eyes have lost the


stare. They have life again. Good luck, it's been a great trip we've taken."

That night was the last time I saw Jim or spoke to him. I never knew his last name, address or phone number. But I knew he understood some of what was tearing me apart. I have Triumphs to thank. It took over a decade, but that glimmer of hope became a beacon. I still have bad days and nights, and don't always sleep. I still look for my friends in crowds, just in case. Without a GT6, a TR6, and that common bond along with being combat vets, who knows what path I may have gone down? Quite possibly, a Triumph GT6, a diner near train tracks, and a chance encounter saved my life.

I still have PTSD. Always will. But it's not overwhelming my life, and I can manage it. I hope if anyone reading this has it as well, you seek help somewhere. It was a long tough fight for me. But it can be overcome. And Jim, wherever you are, thank you. I hope I was able to at least give back to you a fraction of what you gave me. And to everyone reading this, help is a good thing, please don't be ashamed to reach out for it. - Mike
