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

A Little Planning Makes a Big Impact, How I Do It, by Mike Jankowski

When Sharon, Andrew and Kitty approached me about organizing a drive (<u>Cripple Creek, August 8th, photos</u> on page 9), I was excited and trepidatious. I hadn't organized a drive since the '90s. as my last club was very controlling about who was allowed to organize a drive. So once I agreed to be an RMTC drive leader, and reality set in, I got to work. I didn't want to let the club down, so I approached it very methodically and as if I were putting on a paid event. This is the process I followed, and maybe it will help someone reading this to realize it isn't that hard to host a driving event.

The first thing I did was look at the big picture. What would I want if I were to attend? I made a short list;

1) Relaxing roads and scenery: I realized we needed to traverse some main roads, but I kept that to a minimum. I wanted speed limits 45 and under once off the highways. This ensured no one would drive too fast, and that we would all stick together. Plus some of our cars are faster than others, so it evened things out.

2) At lunch, prizes: I wanted to be able to pass time while we waited for food, give folks enjoyable prizes, and have some fun. It helped to keep us all interacting with each other instead of splintering off to groups at tables.

3) Relatively short distance: This is a classic example of knowing your audience so to speak. I took into account how far people had to drive just to get to the start, and then their drive home. We had a meet up at 9:30 AM, then rollout at 10 AM. My goal was to have folks who live on the north side of Denver home by about 5 PM if possible.

With these parameters set, I got onto my laptop and scoured maps, then satellite photos and street views. I wanted to make sure all roads were paved to begin with. Then I would pick spots to use street view and look at the scenery from that perspective. Happy with my samplings from my intended route, I planned my recon drive. My first recon drive I intended to leave Garden of the Gods Trading Post at 10 AM on a Sunday, to get as realistic a data set as possible. Though I was about 30 minutes behind schedule, it was a good simulation.

On the way, I made note of where the gas stations were that could deal with 15 or more cars coming in at once. I looked for ease of entry and exit, always with safety in mind. I noted traffic patterns, traffic lights, and pavement conditions. Once past Divide, I noted line of sight for the left hand turn off highway 24. I also noted a large gravel shoulder that could hold about 15 cars, give or take. I pulled over and wrote some notes down in the notebook I brought along. As I progressed along the route I made note of what turns were tricky, what turns didn't have warning signs, and made mental notes about what would be a safe, enjoyable pace to lead at. I stopped several times along the way, taking pictures, looking around for points of interest, and seeing if the map views bore out my decision. They did.


When I arrived in Cripple Creek, again I noted where gas stations were, and also where to park. I walked around town quite a bit, seeing what lots were public use and free. Not many if at all, really, but I noted a block over from the main street there was ample street parking. I also made arrangements with the restaurant for lunch. The last pieces of the puzzle were to look for a group photo spot and stop at the tunnel, then drive home. I chose Woodland Park as an end point so not only would the option of going north to Deckers be available, but the shopping center would provide a spot for us to rest a bit and then be on our way. A big safety reason was that the traffic light at the entrance to the lot gave direct access across highway 24 to highway 67 for anyone heading that way.

My wife and I drove the course a second time to make sure we could get an accurate feel for how long the drive would be, and to have a final meeting with the restaurant owner. Plus we took more pictures and videos. I feel it is important to send photos and a link to a preview video so folks can make an informed decision on whether or not to attend. I also bounced ideas off Caroline that I had written in my notebook, and she gave some valuable insight and feedback. On a the Monday prior to the original date, I drove the route one more time solo to verify our elapsed time, and to check on some road construction that was occurring.

The week leading up to the drive, I chose what prizes I was going to give, and gathered and packed them on our dining room table. I made a list of what else would be needed as well. Extra bottled water for anyone who needed it, distilled water for topping off a radiator, and a tool kit. I also printed out instruction sheets so anyone who wanted them could have them, and I also brought walkie talkies so the sweep vehicle could let me know if there were problems for anyone in the group and we could double back or wait.

The day of the event was much less stressful for me due to my admittedly OCD planning. But I firmly believe I am responsible for everyone's safety first and foremost, and to provide an enjoyable and stress free outing. I take both of those very seriously. Planning and trial runs ensure that I have the highest odds of accomplishing those goals. Organizing a drive is straightforward, the best advice I can give is to have a plan and know what your goals and parameters are before even getting your eyes on a map.

CCCC Meeting minutes, August 4th, 2021, edited for space.

Legislative: Guest speaker: Matthew Groves of CADA: Matthew discussed Gov. Polis' Greenhouse Gas (GHG) reduction goals for Colorado and how they would affect drivers in the state. These goals supplement the ZEV policy adopted in 2019 and seek to reduce VMT (vehicle miles traveled). An Employee Trip Reduction Program (ETRP) was proposed which would shift the burden to employers with 100 or more employees to have a plan (with reporting requirements) to reduce the number of single vehicle commutes. With opposition from the business community, the ETRP was withdrawn, but the issue has not gone away.

Air Quality problems are real and there is the prospect of loss of federal highway funding. Matthew noted that the role of the Colorado Air Quality Control Commission (AQCC) in implementing regulations and fees is increasing. Also, the ground level ozone compliance standard has become a moving target with more stringent levels in place. Following questions and answers, Matthew and Tim Jackson, president of CADA, were thanked for their insights and for hosting this meeting.
